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STATEWIDE PROPOSITIONS

PROP #, TITLE	DESCRIPTION	NOTES	VOTE
<p>51 Funding for K-12 School and Community College Facilities</p>	<p>Authorizes \$9 billion in general obligation bonds: \$3 billion for new construction and \$3 billion for modernization of K-12 public school facilities; \$1 billion for charter schools and vocational education facilities; and \$2 billion for California Community Colleges facilities.</p>		
<p>52 State Fees on Hospitals, Federal Medi-Cal Matching Funds</p>	<p>For the purpose of obtaining federal Medi-Cal matching funds this measure increases the required vote to two-thirds for the Legislature to amend a certain existing law that imposes fees on hospitals and directs those fees and federal matching funds to hospital-provided Medi-Cal health care services, to uncompensated care provided by hospitals to uninsured patients, and to children's health coverage</p>		
<p>53 Revenue Bonds, State-wide Voter Approval – Cortopassi Initiative</p>	<p>Requires statewide voter approval before any revenue bonds can be issued or sold by the state for projects that are financed, owned, operated, or managed by the state or any joint agency created by or including the state, if the bond amount exceeds \$2 billion. Prohibits dividing projects into multiple separate projects to avoid statewide voter approval requirement.</p>

<p>54 Legislature and Legislative Process</p>	<p>Prohibits Legislature from passing any bill unless it has been in print and published on the internet for at least 72 hours before the vote, except in cases of public emergency. Requires the Legislature to make audiovisual recordings of all its proceedings, except closed session proceedings, and post them on the internet. Authorizes any person to record legislative proceedings by audio or video means, except closed session proceedings.</p>		
<p>55 Tax Extension to Fund Education and Healthcare</p>	<p>Extends by twelve years the temporary personal income tax increases enacted in 2012 on earnings over \$250,000 (for single filers; over \$500,000 for joint filers; over \$340,000 for heads of household). Allocates these tax revenues 89% to K-12 schools and 11% to California Community Colleges. Allocates up to \$2 billion per year in certain years for healthcare programs. Bars use of education revenues for administrative costs, but provides local school governing boards discretion to decide, in open meetings and subject to annual audit, how revenues are to be spent.</p>

<p>56 Tobacco Tax</p>	<p>Increases cigarette tax by \$2.00 per pack, with equivalent increase on other tobacco products and electronic cigarettes containing nicotine. Allocates revenues primarily to increase funding for existing healthcare programs; also for tobacco use prevention/control programs, and administration. Excludes these revenues from Proposition 98 funding requirements. If tax causes decreased tobacco consumption, transfers tax revenues to offset decreases to existing tobacco-funded programs and sales tax revenues. Requires biennial audit.</p>		
<p>57 Juvenile Criminal Proceedings and Sentencing</p>	<p>Allows parole consideration for persons convicted of nonviolent felonies upon completion of full prison term for primary offense, as defined. Authorizes Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation to award sentence credits for rehabilitation, good behavior, or educational achievements. Requires Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation to adopt regulations to implement new parole and sentence credit provisions and certify they enhance public safety. Provides juvenile court judges shall make determination, upon prosecutor motion, whether juveniles' age 14 and older should be prosecuted and sentenced as adults.</p>

<p>58 English Language Education, SB 1174</p>	<p>This bill would amend and repeal various provisions of Proposition 227 (1998), specifically deleting the sheltered English immersion requirement and waiver provisions, and would instead provide that school districts and County Offices of Education shall provide English learner immersion programs and allow parents to choose a language acquisition program that best suits their child.</p>		
<p>59 Campaign Finance: Voter Instruction, SB 254</p>	<p>This measure, a special election measure consolidated with the November 8th General Election, will authorize the Legislature to overturn the Citizens United v. Federal Election Commission (2010) which repealed previous bans on corporate spending in the electoral process.</p>		
<p>60 Adult Film Health Requirements</p>	<p>Requires performers in adult films to use condoms during filming of sexual intercourse.</p>		
<p>61 State RX Drug Prices and Standards</p>	<p>Prohibits state agencies from paying more for a prescription drug than the lowest price paid for the same drug by the United States Department of Veterans Affairs. Applies to any program where the state is the ultimate payer for a drug, even if the state does not purchase the drug directly. Exempts certain purchases of prescription drugs funded through Medi-Cal.</p>		



PROP #, TITLE	DESCRIPTION	NOTES	VOTE
62 Death Penalty	Repeals death penalty as maximum punishment for persons found guilty of murder and replaces it with life imprisonment without possibility of parole. Applies retroactively to persons already sentenced to death.		
63 Firearms and Ammunition Sales	Prohibits possession of large-capacity ammunition magazines, and requires their disposal by sale to dealer, destruction, or removal from state. Requires most individuals to pass background check and obtain Department of Justice authorization to purchase ammunition.		
64 Marijuana Legalization	Legalizes marijuana and hemp under state law. Designates state agencies to license and regulate marijuana industry. Imposes state excise tax on retail sales of marijuana equal to 15% of sales price, and state cultivation taxes on marijuana of \$9.25 per ounce of flowers and \$2.75 per ounce of leaves.		
65 Carry-out Bag Charges	Redirects money collected by grocery and certain other retail stores through sale of carry-out bags, whenever any state law bans free distribution of a particular kind of carry-out bag and mandates the sale of any other kind of carry-out bag. Requires stores to deposit bag sale proceeds into a special fund administered by the Wildlife Conservation Board to support specified categories of environmental projects.

<p>66 Death Penalty Procedures</p>	<p>Changes procedures governing state court appeals and petitions challenging death penalty convictions and sentences. Designates the Superior Court for initial petitions and limits successive petitions. Imposes time limits on state court death penalty review.</p>		
<p>67 Referendum to Overturn Single-Use Bag Ban</p>	<p>If signed by the required number of registered voters and timely filed with the Secretary of State, this petition will place on the statewide ballot a challenge to a state law previously approved by the Legislature and the Governor.</p>

PROP #, TITLE	DESCRIPTION	NOTES	VOTE
<p>B Lilac Hills Ranch Specific Plan Initiative</p>	<p>If approved by voters in November, this initiative will change the General Plan for the 608 acres from Semi-Rural 4 (SR-4) with 1 dwelling unit per 4, 8, or 16 gross acres and Semi-Rural 10 (SR-10) with 1 dwelling unit per 10 or 20 gross acres to a project proposal that includes mixed use development of 1,746 residents and 90,000 square feet of commercial, retail, and parks.</p> <p>This measure would require a simple majority (50% +1) for approval.</p>		
<p>A SANDAG ½ Cent Sales Tax</p>	<p>½ cent sales tax to raise \$18 billion over 40 years to fund SANDAG's San Diego Forward Regional Plan. The plan will allocate (in millions) \$4,322 to local infrastructure projects, \$178 for signal synchronization, \$900 to road grade separation, \$540 to active transportation, \$2,000 to open space, \$615 for highways, \$1,940 for managed and HOV lanes and \$7,507 for transit.</p> <p>This measure would require a 2/3rds majority for approval.</p>

PROP #, TITLE	DESCRIPTION	NOTES	VOTE
<p>M Article 34 – San Diego Housing Commission (SDHC) Capacity Authorization</p>	<p>If approved, this measure will increase the capacity for the SDHC to acquire, construct, or develop low-rent housing with the assistance of government financing from 10,500 (current capacity) to 38,000 units. This measure does not include a tax increase or financing mechanism.</p>		
<p>I Amendment to City Charter Section 55 – San Diego High School</p>	<p>This measure will allow the City of San Diego and the San Diego Unified School District to negotiate a new lease to allow San Diego High School to operate a public high school at its current location and use the dedicated park property for educational, cultural, recreational, and civic programs and activities.</p>		
<p>J Proposition C Mission Bay Regional Park (2008) Changes</p>	<p>This measure will extend the expiration of Proposition C (2008) by 30 years, from 2039 to 2069. It also includes clarifying language to expedite priority project completion and implement cash management best practices. Additionally, the measure includes a modification to the formula that defines the fund disbursement to allow for additional resources to be made available for Balboa and other regional parks.</p>

<p>K Candidate Elections – Mandatory Runoffs</p>	<p>This measure would eliminate the provision that a candidate can win office with a majority of votes in June primaries. This measure would require a November runoff for all elections for Mayor, Council, and City Attorney between the top two vote earners, regardless of one candidate receiving more than 50% of the primary vote.</p>		
<p>L Ballot Measure Elections – November Elections</p>	<p>This measure would require that some ballot measures be placed on the November ballot, including citizens initiatives and referendums. Charter initiatives and Council directed initiatives could still be placed before voters during primary elections in June.</p>		
<p>F City Attorney Probationary Period</p>	<p>This measure will amend City Charter Section 40 to reduce the probationary period for Deputy City Attorney's from two years to one year.</p>		
<p>G Citizens Review Board on Police Practices</p>	<p>This measure will amend City Charter Section 43(d) to further define the role of the Citizens Review Board; it's relation to the Mayor and City Council, and to change the name from "Citizen's Review Board on Police Practices" to "Community Review Board on Police Practices." It contains additional cleanup language to replace references to "City Manager" with "Mayor and City Council" and will require that the Board review all cases involving in-custody deaths and officer related shootings.</p>

<p>N Cannabis Business Tax</p>	<p>This measure will impose a gross receipts tax on recreational marijuana businesses to be phased in at 5% for the first two years and increased to 8% thereafter, while also providing City Council the authority to further increase the tax to 15% at their discretion.</p>		
<p>H Cleanup Language for Purchasing and Contracting</p>	<p>This article will amend Article V, by repealing Section 35; and amending Article VII by repealing Sections 94.1, 94.2, 94.3, 94.4, 98, and 113, retitling Section 97, and amending Sections 94, 99, 100 and 102, all relating to purchasing and contracting processes.</p>		
<p>E Cleanup Language to the Charter on Succession, Vacancy, and Removal of Elected Officials</p>	<p>This measure will amend City Charter Sections 7, 12, 40, 108, 217, 218, and 265 and add a new Article XVI to provide consistency in forfeiture and succession provisions, to outline qualifications in the office of the City Attorney, to define vacancy for all elective offices, and provide a procedure for removing elective officers.</p>

<p>D Briggs Citizen's Initiative</p>	<p>If approved by voters, the Citizen's Initiative would increase the hotel tax (TOT) to 15.5%. It would eliminate the current 4% earmark of TOT revenues for promoting the City and eliminate the TMD. The measure would restrict development at the Qualcomm site to University, tourism, and park related uses and prohibit a waterfront expansion of the Convention Center. It authorizes a professional sports stadium in Mission Valley or downtown within a defined "Convention and Entertainment Overlay Zone," but does not require either.</p> <p>Brigg's maintains that this measure would require only a simply majority (50+1) to pass. The City Attorney has opined that this measure requires a 2/3rds majority vote.</p>		
<p>C Chargers Stadium Plan Initiative</p>	<p>If approved by voters, the Charger's Stadium Plan would allow for the creation of a joint-use stadium-convention center facility in downtown San Diego. It would also increase the Transient Occupancy Tax to 16.5% to partially finance the project.</p> <p>This measure would require a 2/3rds majority vte to pass.</p>
